PROGRAMS

I hope you are all enjoying your organza stitch kits from the last meeting. I apologize for the very minimal instruction given on the project because of time constraints so, if you have questions about how to proceed, do feel free to bring your kit to the next meeting and seek the assistance of any of our many stitchers who have experience in thread painting. Board members will be discussing how best to balance meeting, show and share, and socializing time as well as carve out time for a program to accommodate everything we want to get done in our time together in future meetings.

The planned program for the April meeting is Kogin embroidery. Kogin is another Japanese technique similar to sashiko in that it uses only the running stitch and its primary purpose was to strengthen clothing with the beauty of the embellishment being secondary. Unlike sashiko, it requires an even weave fabric and counting. Even so, the basics are very quick to learn and the materials, or appropriate substitutes, affordable and easy to obtain.

We will be stitching small motifs to make a pin cushion. The chapter will provide fabric (18 count cream aida or light green linen), thread, and a small wooden bowl to finish the pin cushion. Please bring a blunt tipped, big eyed needle suitable for stitching on congress cloth, 18 count aida, or 20 count linen. If you prefer to choose your own colors, any 18 to 22 count even weave fabric is suitable (a five inch square) and pearl cotton size 5 or 8 in a contrasting thread. Caron Watercolours (1 ply), Wild flowers, or Impressions can also work depending on the count of the fabric used. The project should require no more than a yard of thread so this is a good project to finish off a partial skein of a beautiful thread.

Other material required to finish the pincushion will be a small amount of batting or filling and a glue like E6000 to secure the cushion in the bowl. I would add if you are looking for other ideas for this project, consider making a name tag with one of the designs.

Speaking of the designs, the following two links are to free patterns of the two main styles of kogin. The <u>first</u> <u>link</u> is Carolyn Foley's blog with pdf links for 700 *hishizashi* patterns. The distinguishing feature of hishizashi is that stitching is always over an even number of threads. This has the effect of creating elongated diamonds (see the red and green box in the photo). The <u>second link is Kogin Bank</u>'s Modoco data base of kogin-zashi patterns which are stitched over an odd number of threads so an enclosed pattern will be square (the other designs in the photo).

There will be examples of each type of kogin included with your kit but feel free to look through the two links and choose your own pattern. If doing the pin cushion, the full sized hishizashi diamonds will be too large though a small, repeating motif from inside the diamond frame will work.

Note, there will be a limited number of extra wooden bowls available for sale (\$3 ea) for those who want them.

In April, the beading group will be working on a beaded 3dimensional Icosadodecahedron bauble by Debby Zook of the Northwest Bead Society.

While the actual beading is pretty simple and is beginner friendly, because there are a lot of parts, there is a bit of homework before the meeting.

Before attending the meeting, please bead five 4-row triangles following the pattern included in this newsletter, finishing off both your working and tail threads on each triangle.

If you want to work ahead and make more triangles, feel free. You will need 20 overall. In class, we will work on a pentagon and joining the triangles to the pentagon.

A note on choosing colors: You will need four colors of size 11/o Miyuki Delicas. Two possible colorways are listed in the instructions.

For the best contrast, if you are not using one of the example colorways, please pick a light and dark in two colors. Make sure that there is a strong contrast between the light and the dark color and that the two colors are also distinct.

While the name might be difficult to say, the beading is beginner friendly, so we hope to have lots of you join in! See you in April!

Our May meeting will be a "catch-up" meeting, where we'll bring projects in progress to get help and work toward finishing.

Icosadodecahedron With Depressed Star

Design & Instructions by Debby Zook



An icosahedron is made of 20 triangles. A dodecahedron is made of 12 pentagons. And an icosadodecahedron is made of 20 triangles plus 12 pentagons. That is what this project is. In addition, the pentagons here are not the usual flat pentagons, but are made with a depressed (or if you turn it around a protruding) star in the center. I designed this project so the pattern does not outline the pentagons and triangles, but rather has a pattern that crosses from one to the other.

Color Codes: A- Lavender (DB 2138) B- Purple (DB2510) Christmas Colors: A- Red (DB0214) B- Gold (DB0410) C- Mint green (DB 2122) D- Dark turquoise (DB2514) C- White (DB0202) D- Green (DB0274)

TRIANGLE - Make 20 of these. The Triangle has only four rounds.

R1	Pick up 3C beads. Form into a circle by tying a knot or using a fireline circle join. If you leave a tail you can weave it in as soon as you have enough beads added.	
R2	Add 2C beads after each C in R1. These are the corners of the triangle and will form the herringbone spine of the triangle. Step up through first bead added in R2. Rounds 2-4 are increase rounds.	
R3	Add 2C beads in each corner. Add one D bead on each side. Step up through first bead added in R3.	
R4	Add CDC beads in each corner. Add one D bead twice on each side (peyote stitch). Step up through the first bead added in R4. The D bead at the point is actually part of the joining round so it doesn't "count" when counting the beads along the sides of the triangle. You now have four beads along each side.	Weave in your working thread and your tail thread on each triangle


